






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


Our Vision

Hello and welcome to our Impact Report for 2019-2020. It has been a strange and difficult year for all of us in many ways as we have adapted to the restrictions Covid-19 has placed on us all, but it has also been a very rewarding and positive year; bringing out the best in everyone.

It was with great sadness that we said our final farewells to Barrie Evason in February. Jennyruth Workshops is the place we see today due to all his hard work and determination over many years.

I first met Barrie and Jonathan at a village fete 23 years ago when Lucy was still only a baby. Back then, they were selling products made at home and the Workshops as we know it was just an idea. We now have 28 workers attending and a waiting list.

As many of you will already know, I took over in my current role on 1st October 2019 having been the finance administrator since 2016. I feel a great sense of responsibility to do Barrie proud and often over the last few months particularly, I have found myself wondering what he would think of the altered world we have found ourselves in.

Recently we featured in an article in the Yorkshire Post...Barrie's daughter, Bryony, said...'Dad would have been enormously proud ©But not just of the wonderful workers but of how the staff and volunteers have adapted to the new climate, enabling the workers to continue to grow and blossom. You are all truly amazing!'

I could not be prouder of how my team of staff and volunteers have pulled together both at the workshops and at home and found so many creative ways to support the workers remotely since March whilst learning to embrace the virtual world of zoom.

We were due to welcome the workers back after 7 months of home working but this has been delayed due to the latest Government restrictions. When it is safe for them to return, it will bring with it a period of adjustment for everyone which I know we will get through together just as we have the separation.

The next few pages are full of what we have been doing and what we will be doing going forward taking us into to 2021. If you would like to get involved with the Workshop as a worker/volunteer/supporter/sponsor I would love to hear from you.

The disruption faced Nationally was compounded with the problems which beset many of our wonderful Workers. Nicky and her team rallied to the cause and although we had to close the Workshops; they immediately set about arranging the most varied and wide ranging activities to ensure all our Workers had some form of continuity and could maintain communication with each other.

Zoom meetings, a 'Pick-up' and 'Drop-off' point enabling workers to continue to complete products, were set up, along with some wonderfully unique ideas to occupy workers who could be cut off from social interaction. The whole team, Staff, Workers and Volunteers have worked tirelessly building a weekly timetable of events. 600miles walk, Poetry, Stories, amazing craft ideas, ensured we could offer to fill the days of our team of Workers. The loan of lap-tops ensured all Workers had access to some form of input from the Workshops.

The future is now being planned, with a speedy re-arrangement of accommodation, and some very exciting plans to extend the Workshops, all very necessary if we are to tackle the long term effects the Pandemic has set before us. With the support of our Landlords at Newby Hall Estates, we can look forward to the uncertain times ahead, with an assured confidence that we will be ahead of any regulations. Safety and security of our whole team is our 'watch-word'. With clear financial planning ensuring we have a strong 'reserve funding' we can move forward with our long term plans in the knowledge that we have a financially secure future and will maintain the excellence upon which Barrie's vision for Jennyruth Workshops was based.

It is custom at this point that the Chairman thank everyone for their efforts over the past year!

As time has gone on, we have adapted and developed what we offer remotely to include a Workers Zone on the website full of resources they can access in a safe environment.

We have chosen to see the positives in all of this and are working hard to complete renovations to the building. The new kitchen is finally finished and looks fabulous. The office has been resited allowing all office staff to be at work rather than a rota system. Planning is in to upgrade the toilets, put in a staircase to the loft for storage and for a large extension to enable us to meet regulations in the post COVID world.







OUR WORKERS

We have 28 workers who attend both full and parttime. The age range is from 19-73. Daily attendance averages 18 at present and we do have a waiting list.



Alongside hands-on workshop experience, we offer a wide range of training courses to enable our workers to gain new skills, confidence, and experience.

Workers get involved with every aspect of the business; from working in the office alongside our business support team to helping design, make and paint our products with the paintshop and woodwork staff.

They meet customers and attend community events as ambassadors of the Workshops whenever possible.



Our workers are at the centre of everything we do here at the Workshop. They are involved in as many aspects of the business as is possible and are at the forefront of every decision that is made.

He keeps the paintshop supplied with our stock habitat range and has even found the time to add a few new products to the line.




PUBLICITY AND MEDIA








The workers have a been a key part of the marketing process by recording videos advertising their favourite products, being interviewed on the radio and tv, and writing articles for newsletters.







A TRIBUTE TO OUR FOUNDER BARRIE EVASON

Jennyruth Workshops founder, Barrie Evason died aged 81 on the 29th February this year shortly before we were hit by the global pandemic.

A few weeks later, as the full implications of the effect of the pandemic on Jennyruth Workshops became apparent, staff, workers and volunteers adapted to a whole new way of working.

Our CO Nicky Newell said, "I think Barrie would be saying well done to everyone for how they are pulling together and going above and beyond."

Barrie and his wife Sue's fundamental belief that adults with learning disabilities can lead productive, fulfilled lives is still evident today as the workshops continue to innovate and adapt to the present circumstances with many of the workers continuing to produce beautiful and useful products in their own homes with guidance from staff on Zoom and other means of communication.

Despite a variety of restrictions brought about by the virus we still fulfil Barrie's wish that these quality products are sold at craft fairs, local shops and garden centres. In addition Jennyruth Workshops maintains the tradition of producing quality bespoke products for a wide range of clients.

When Barrie was awarded the MBE for his service to people with learning disabilities at Jennyruth Workshops he said to the Harrogate Informer:

I was just the one who had the idea.

Many people, some with professional skills, some very good DIY-ers, and many who were just prepared to come along and give us their support in any number of ways, are responsible for that initial idea coming to fruition.

I'm only sorry I can't cut up the award and give them all a piece, but whenever any of them see the letters MBE after my name I hope they will take it as their reward, too.

I did what I wanted to do, and my reward is seeing the wonderful place we have, where people who have learning disabilities can come to gain skills, use those skills, and live a rewarding life.

Barrie took a lot of convincing that he deserved the MBE and was only pacified when he was told that Sue would receive the same award in the following months.


Barrie and Sue were tenacious in their commitment to their adopted family and their own children. They spent many years tackling authorities and others who did not understand that it was possible to create an organisation like Jennyruth Workshops that would demonstrate the potential abilities and aptitudes of children and adults who had a variety of learning disabilities and were able to make a significant contribution to their local communities and the world in general.

Barrie and the Jennyruth staff proved beyond doubt that the workers could produce beautifully decorated and useful products to a very high standard and were able to both sell these products to customers and give talks to a variety of groups about the work they carried out at the Workshops. The present staff, volunteers and trustees are proud that these expectations and high standards continue to this day.

Despite the current troubled times Jennyruth Workshops still lives up to Barrie and Sue's vision, and the staff and trustees are currently working tirelessly to make significant developments to the building to enable workers to return to a building that will be able to accommodate everyone safely in a way that will meet the requirements of life in the global pandemic.















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
